April Program- Video Capture and Editing by Henry Norton

If you have purchased a new camera, you probably know it's video capable; maybe you've captured some vacation scenes or sporting events. April's presentation will be about video capture and editing presented by Henry Norton, Apache Helicopter's photo and video expert. Discussion will be directed to getting better capture and editing techniques, along with information on tomorrow's trends. A short 10 minute on-screen intro to editing in Adobe Premier Pro will be presented. Various editing functions and tools along with tips about saving videos will be explained.

Henry Norton is a long time resident of Huntsville, and is in his first year as Program Officer for HPS. He has been a member for about 1 ½ years. He is currently employed in the Apache Project Office as a Visual Information Specialist in charge of photography and has documented significant military developments throughout the U.S.

From The President

The weather is making it so much easier to get out and shoot so I'm getting excited to see what April has in store for us and our photography.

This past month, I've been researching the benefits of using wide and long lenses and trying to quantify when to use one over the other. As for wide angle lenses, it seems the key benefit is their ability to include elements of surroundings environmental with your subject. While longer (telephoto-type) lenses are better at masking (or blurring) out the environment so the subject gets the most attention.

So, deciding to go long or wide should be based on if the stuff around your subject adds to and takes away from the

story of your image. So, a portrait is not always best with a 200mm f/2.8 and a landscape may not be best with a 15mm f/16. Considering how the subject and the environment interact is the key to telling the story with an image and as a photographer, it's important to think about this.

This month's competition subject is Roads in North Alabama. Our judge is Eric Mittman. Just a reminder that digital entries are due April 18.

The Pelicans of Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge by Joy Henderson

Photographing American White Pelicans at Ding Darling Wildlife Refuge on a recent trip to Sanibel, Florida I noticed one bird among the many that looked a little different. Although it was a distant shot I photographed it because of its unusual appearance. The next day the bird was much closer and I was told it was a Great White Pelican whose normal range is Africa and Asia. I took many photos including the bird in flight. The flight photo appeared in the Ding Darling Newsletter.



We see the American White Pelicans on migration through the Huntsville area. Their wingspan is near 8 feet. The wingspan of the Great White Pelican can reach near 12 feet. The Great White Pelican has a pink color, a gold mask and a bump on the front of the head easily identified. The Pelican was at Ding





Darling two days and left on the third day. The origin of this bird has not been discovered. Possibly it escaped from a private zoo. Experts say the odds of this bird being a natural vagrant are very long and there has never been a reported sighting in this area that it is not considered to be impossible.

From last month's newsletter: A bioblitz is when people come together for a short period to survey the life which occurs on a particular area (flier attached). A good list of species that occur there can be created in a relatively short period of time, especially when experts with various organisms are present and can identify them in the field.

How can photographers contribute? I e-mailed the manager of the preserve and he stated that he has been so busy at past ones that he has very few photographs of the activities. Thus, we can take some of these for him. In addition, we can photograph plants, animals, etc. on the preserve. Given a release, he can use the various photographs in presentations and outreach/education efforts. I would encourage photographers to sign a release(s) for this purpose. It is a way of volunteering your time and effort to help conserve natural resources in the state. Some species photographed will occur in much larger areas and photos can be used to

promote conservation in general. However, there is no requirement to do so.
