From The President

Last night at our monthly photo competition, I was reminded of the first time I competed at HPS. I had just joined the club, hadn't read over the requirements for competition, and brought two prints without my name and the required little arrow on the back. When they came to my prints and held them up saying there was no name on the back and asked for anyone to claim the orphaned photos, I did not

dare raise my hand. I was so embarrassed! At the end, I waited until no one was looking, snuck up to the table, grabbed the photos and made a quick exit. I actually considered just leaving the photos on the table.

It was several years before I ventured to compete again. Competition was never my favorite thing anyway. Having worked for many years with teenagers, I knew firsthand the devastating effect competition can have on those fragile, vulnerable young psyches. Winning makes them feel good about themselves but losing can often do permanent damage. Teenagers are struggling to discover their self-worth and often have a difficult time separating their feelings about themselves from the evaluations that others place on something they do or create. They struggle to find their own talents, and often when they can't find anything at which they excel, they become depressed, more self-conscious, sultry, and even rebellious. Winning is great; losing is very, very difficult for them.


Of course, we adults are supposed to be above all that, aren't we? I'm thinking of the tragic shooting this week in Jacksonville. From what I understand, a very fragile, adult individual was defeated at perhaps the one thing at which he excelled. Feeling his value as a human being threatened, perhaps he sought to eliminate that which threatened his value, the individuals who had defeated him—the winners who confirmed his underlying feeling of being a loser.

As we all know, however, there is great value in competition. I started competing again because my friend Tom Bryant encouraged me. "You learn so much more when you compete," he would say. That is so true! When we dare to put those things which we have produced up against the things that others have produced and have them evaluated by someone with experience and good judgement, we can see where we need to improve in order to produce something better. The trick is to understand that it is the value of the image being judged, not us as an individual—that is so important! Maybe that's what it means to be an adult—to separate our evaluation of ourselves from the world's evaluation of what we do or produce.

I write all this to encourage those who aren't competing to join in the competition. Your images will not always win. Some will not receive any recognition, others will get an honorable mention, but eventually your images will be singled out as first, second or third place. Even after your images begin winning in competitions, they will still lose sometimes, but you as an individual will always win even when your images lose. You will learn, improve, grow, see the world differently, begin to express yourself in ways that others can see, and find a greater sense of self-worth. That's what happens when we compete as adults.

Photography Workshop at Wheeler Refuge



Joe Anderson has been into photography both as a hobby and professionally since 1958. Since retirement in the late 90's he has traveled all over Europe, Scandinavia and Iceland enjoying photography. Six years ago he started traveling the States in his motorhome and volunteering for the US Fish and Wildlife Service at Refuges from coast to coast. This has giving him a golden opportunity to capture unforgettable images. He will share this great journey with you during a 2 day photo workshop, to be held over two weekends (Saturdays only). There is no cost for the workshop.

- If interested in DVD of slideshow presentation and other info, it can be purchased on either Saturday for \$5.00 CASH or CHECK only. Please mention in email when registering.

The first day will be at the Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center on HWY 67 in Decatur AL, on Saturday, Sept 8, 2018. The program will start promptly at 9 AM in the auditorium. If you plan to attend please be there at least 15 minutes early. The first phase of this workshop will cover how to photograph birds. The program will start with a 40 minute slideshow presentation about camera settings, ways



to attract birds, and recommendations regarding your camera and lens which can improve your photos. After a short break there will be a second slideshow on how to photograph



question and answer sessions. Lunch is BYO

(bring your own). After lunch, phase two will include venturing outside to try some of the tips covered in the morning. Bring your camera and lenses, and tripod that you use for birds and landscape.





The second day of the workshop will be the following weekend, on Saturday evening, September 15, with three outside events, photographing star trails, photographing bugs at night, and light painting, **place and time yet to be determined**. For the 15th you will need camera, macro lens, and a lens such as a 24-105mm along with tripod.






