PHOTOGENIC SITES- WHEELER NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE (NWR)

At the May 13, 2002 meeting, I presented information on five photogenic sites on Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge north of the Tennessee River. At that time, the audience requested that directions to each site be published in the newsletter. Below are directions to each site and a few of the photogenic subjects you may encounter. The directions start with the western-most site and proceed in an easterly fashion. **1. West side of Limestone Bay**- Take the Mooresville Exit off I-565 and head south toward Mooresville. Take a right at the stop sign. After about 3/4-1 mile you will cross over Limestone Creek on a bridge. Look for a gravel road to the left about 200-300 yards beyond the creek. Go straight on this road (Arrowhead Landing) until you come into the vicinity of a boat ramp. Possible subjects- beautiful sunrises, wildflowers, egrets, herons, waterfowl (fall and winter), people boating and fishing, lovely fall colors.

2. East side of Limestone Bay (Gravel borrow pits)—NOTICE: This area is closed temporary until the furor caused by recent misinformation about the alligators by WAFF TV dies down.--Take the Greenbrier Road exit off I-565 and head south (Past the Chevron Station). A paved road curves off to the right about 1-1 ½ miles south of I-565. Take this road and go straight- you will enter a gravel road and go through the refuge gate (Open in late Spring, Summer and early Fall). Take the second gravel road to the right (somewhat rough- go slow) and you will come to a small pond on your right. This is one of the several gravel pits in the area that have filled with water. Possible subjects-American Alligators, fishermen, butterflies feeding and puddling (drinking water from the wet soil)(mainly Summer and Fall), dragonflies, and damselflies.

3. Rockhouse Landing- A. Cliffs- Take the Greenbrier Road exit off I-565 and head south. You will begin to turn to the left (east) and cross Limestone Creek after 1-1 ½ miles. After crossing the creek, take the first paved road to the right. This is Rockhouse Road. Go straight until the pavement ends and you enter a gravel road. You will see a small Wheeler NWR sign. Immediately to your left is a gravel road- take it. Go about 200-300 yards and there will be a gate on your right. Park there (Do not block the gate), walk through the gate and straight ahead about 100 yards is the edge of the cliff. You can go down to the base in either direction- to the right is the easiest way. Possible subjects- wildflowers, salamanders (in rock cracks and crevices), cliff face, dragonflies and damselflies. B. Riverfront- When you enter the gravel road at the end of Rockhouse Road, go straight instead of turning left. This will take you to the Tennessee River. I usually follow the road to the first gate and park in that area. Possible subjects- awesome sunrises and sunsets (fog-filled mornings in early spring and late fall), herons and egrets, fishermen, and beautiful fall colors.

4. Beaverdam Swamp- Get onto Madison Boulevard (Highway 20) and go to the light at County Line Road. Head south and cross over I-565. Take the first road to the right. This will end in a circular parking area. Walk between the wooden planters and onto a gravel path and follow this path to the swamp. Do **not** leave the gravel path or boardwalk (Signs post area where entry is prohibited). Possible subjects- butterflies at the beginning of the trail in the old gravel parking area (warm seasons when wildflowers are present), wonderful reflections (Swamp may dry in summer), surface ice formations (cold winter days), public use of boardwalk (perfect place to use models for romantic pictures), wildflowers, fungi, dragonflies, etc.

5. Blackwell Swamp- Get onto County Line Road at Madison Boulevard and head south. After several miles (3-4?) look for a small paved road on the left called Jolly B. Take this road. After ½-1 mile you can enter a gravel Road on the left just beyond a trailer. This will take you down the east side of Blackwell Swamp. To go down the west side of the swamp, go beyond this gravel road on Jolly B another 100 yards and there is another gravel road on your left (You will see a small Wheeler NWR sign). Take this road. Do not go beyond this road on Jolly B because it is private property and is posted. Possible subjects- Reflections, sunrises (from west side) and sunsets (from east side), wildflowers, water lilies, dragonflies, fishermen, people in canoes, horseback riders, etc.

--There are gravel roads that lead along the Tennessee River from Rockhouse Landing to Blackwell Swamp that are open most of the year (February 15- October 15). These can be explored to see other subjects. Without fail, when I go to the refuge for more than 1/2 hour with my photo gear I come back with some pictures. If you are interested in photographing the outdoors, I think you will too! Not interested in photographing it- then go out and see the beauty to relax and refresh your soul.
