If it's worth framing, it's worth protecting! (Part 1) by Ken Seal

Have you ever had an autograph literally conservation glass and UV acrylics, but fade away and disappear? How about an important photograph yellow? Ever seen brilliant colors fade? How about a computer crash and now you only have a few prints of those favorite photos you thought you could produce at will? Of coarse all of these not only affect you emotionally, but also can be felt in your wallet! If it's worth framing, then it's worth protecting! You have heard about

now there is an easier and less expensive alternative with the new Picture Shields UV inserts.

Let's start with the basics. There are four main causes for fading over time.

1. Ultraviolet (UV) light from direct and indirect sunlight. This invisible band of light is the same type which causes your sunburn. It accounts for almost half of

1990; with a photo spread of his work featured on the magazine's center two pages. This issue featured one photographer from each of several countries around the world.

He began his photographic work in 1986, and has utilized a variety of camera formats for his work since then. He now prefers digital cameras for wildlife, candid portraits, fine art, and travel photography; and larger format panoramic equipment for landscapes. He has specialized in panoramic photography since 1992. He also utilizes a digital SLR modified for infrared to create compositions in both blackand-white and color infrared.

This presentation will cover a number of aspects of light and its obvious importance to photography. After all, the word photography means "writing with light". The following topics will be discussed: exposure, types of light, quality of light, ambient lighting, lighting with flash, mixing ambient and flash, and lighting topics specific to digital photography. In particular, the digital camera histogram will be discussed. Photographs will be included as examples. The presentation will end with a short digital photo show including photos from Muril's latest photo trip, a December 2007 trip to photograph birds at Bosque del Apache and the landscapes of White Sands.

Bosque and White Sands are both in Southern New Mexico.




Shelf Fungus Backlit

Also another holder held a second lens, and I clipped it on my belt loop (make sure your belt loops are good and tight on your pants!). I clipped another one to the other side holding my water. Very light and efficient for getting on and off tour buses or hopping out real quick at a roadside stop. You might want to make sure your pants fit good before adding extra weight to the belt loops (or wear a belt)!

Separate from our monthly competition, each participant received an item from Dollar Tree to photograph in a creative way (other than for what the item was intended). PSA-Supported Exhibitions

The Photographic Society of America directly sponsors several photographic exhibitions and competitions each year. The accepted entries are shown at the annual PSA conference each September.

However, PSA supports hundreds of other photo exhibitions for photographers worldwide. You do not need to be an individual member of PSA to enter the exhibitions. You can see a list of the upcoming exhibitions in each month's issue of the PSA Journal. The organizers of each exhibition, worldwide, have each agreed to a set of guidelines developed by PSA that help guarantee uniformity and consistency between different exhibitions. Many of the entry forms can be downloaded at <u>www.psa-photo.org</u> under "Competitions", then "Exhibition Forms", and then "Exhibitions". An exhibition typically receives up to four entries by photographers in each section of its exhibition. A certain percentage is "Accepted" during judging for final showing to audiences. Honorable Mentions, First, Second, and Third awards, and perhaps some special awards are also given. The entries are returned by mail to their makers after the exhibitions are over, along with a catalog of the results.

Personal lists of all "accepted" and award-winning entries from different PSA-supported exhibitions can be submitted by their maker to PSA for recognition by the earning of "stars" in each division of PSA. To do so, the maker must be an individual member of PSA.

The next issue of our HPS newsletter will look at exhibition stars and awards from PSA.

the fading.

- 2. Heat. Primarily from the sun, but also other heat sources like fireplaces and heat ducts.
- 3. Visible light. Most visible light contains some UV, particularly those florescent bulbs that are becoming so popular. They produce many times more UV than an incandescent bulb.
- 4. A potpourri of things like dust, grease in the air, and humidity. Even oxygen over time helps fuel the decay of the organic composition in the pigments and papers.

So the first step is to minimize the damage from these sources.

- Do not place your valuable pieces in direct sunlight
- Keep them away from direct heat sources
- Use incandescent bulbs to light them, and with the lowest possible setting.
- Cover the item in a frame to keep it as clean as possible. Be careful of having the piece directly against the glass as items like older photos could actually attach themselves to the glass and when removed will stick to the glass and become damaged. Use an acid free mat to separate.

The next step is to add protection to limit the UV damage. There are several commercial products that have been developed over the years to help reduce the amount of fading. <u>No product will eliminate fading</u>. It is important to select a product that will reduce at least 95% of the ultraviolet radiation but preferably 99%. Each has its own strengths, and weaknesses. Cost, percentage of protection, ease of use, scratch resistance, glare control, and cleaning are all important considerations.

We'll look at various alternatives in Part 2 of this article in the July newsletter.
