From The President

2019 Review

As we approach our business meeting on November 12, I thought I would give you a little overview of what we have done this past year. In all our planning as a board, we try to follow the stated purpose of our organization. It's the reason we exist; the DNA for our organization. Just to remind you, the purpose of the Huntsville Photographic Society is as follows:



To promote the enjoyment, mastery, and furtherance of photography as art, communication media, and recreational activity through cooperation, effort, and good fellowship.

Over the past two years, our board has met for a short retreat to look at our purpose, consider our needs and make plans for the coming year. We will hold our planning retreat for next year on January 11. At that time, we will look carefully at the two surveys I have asked you to complete as we think about programs, workshops, and other activities for the coming year. That's why your input on those surveys is so vitally important. I thank you if you have filled them out already and encourage you to fill them out if you have not yet done so.

At this past year's retreat (2019), our board members came up with four objectives:

- Hold four quality workshops
- Develop a Novice Competition
- Present a Variety of Quality Programs
- Develop Outreach with Youth Competitions

During the year, as opportunities became available, we have worked to accomplish those objectives, several of which have broadened as the year progressed.

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Hold Four Quality Workshops

For me, this was probably the most difficult objective since I had no one single officer assigned to complete this task. The first workshop was a joint one with Burritt on the Mountain where we coordinated with the staff there to produce several different shooting and learning opportunities for members of HPS and the whole Huntsville/Madison County area. From that experience, we developed a small task force to work on the remaining workshops and look at the possibilities for 2020. From last year's survey, we learned that many of our members were not comfortable using Lightroom and Photoshop, so we put together a day long workshop for each. The Lightroom workshop brought together 18 individuals at Trinity United Methodist Church where we learned ways to use both the Library mode and the Develop mode in Lightroom. Our Photoshop workshop will be held again at Trinity on November 23.

These three workshops combined with Henry Smith's great Photography 201 class, served to complete our objective of four workshops for this year. We had also tried to plan a Macro workshop but were unable to do that on such short notice for 2019, so that workshop has been scheduled for February 1, 2020 at Faith Presbyterian Church.

This year was the first attempt for me, and perhaps for HPS as a whole, to put together so many learning experiences in one year, but we learned a lot and hope that we can continue to develop other great learning experiences in the future.

Develop a Novice Competition

Under the very capable leadership of Earl Todd, we produced not a competition, but a whole novice program that has been tremendously successful. The program was developed to help our newer and less experienced members to develop their photography skills and become comfortable with getting helpful feedback on their images. With an instruction segment planned for each month prior to a program night and a critique night planned prior each competition night, the program has grown and proved extremely helpful to our members. And from what I hear, Earl has some even more exciting things planned for the future. Stay tuned for further info.

Provide a Variety of Quality Programs

Henry Norton and Roger Hunter have indeed worked hard to provide a variety of helpful and informative programs for us this year. From training programs in Photoshop, video instructions on portraiture, to our recent programs on the Alabama's 200th Anniversary, I have learned a lot

Develop Outreach with Youth Competitions

We haven't actually developed youth competitions, but we are now developing a much closer relationship with two of the high school photography programs in the area – Sparkman High and Lee High's Magnet Program. We are pursuing a policy which would bring in these young people as a group, allowing the students to compete in our competitions and become active in our programs. This is just in the beginning stages but say tuned for more information.

At our business meeting on November 12, we will elect officers for 2020 and approve a budget for 2020. All of this is necessary to keep things running smoothly and allow us to do the work we have planned. I hope you will make a special effort to be there.

Each participant will submit one regular/straight photo to show what the object actually is. Each participant will also submit three additional photos (or less, if you are not feeling particularly creative) that show your creativity. These photos must include the object. You may use the whole object or any part of the object. It does not even have to be recognizable nor does it have to be the main subject of the photo. The photo does not have to show the object's intended use.

Your creativity must take place in camera, not in Photoshop or other related programs. You may use these programs for basic corrections such as cropping, straightening, etc. but not for cloning, filters, major color alterations, layers, etc.



Each participant's images will be shown during the program at the Nov. 12 meeting.






