My name is Trey Walker, a 27-year-old, full time filmmaker and photographer. I'm self-taught and learn by trial and error. My





In the Mood By Charles Gattis

At our September competition, Patrick Oden mentioned the "mood" of a picture several times, and in doing so broadened that concept for me. I was used to saying that an image was moody, meaning that it conveyed a rather dark or eerie feeling in me. But as Patrick used the term several times, I began to think of mood almost as a synonym of feeling.

Really good images evoke a feeling in individuals—that's a paraphrase of something Patrick said. Feelings relate to mood. Though some say that mood in an image is all about the lighting, and much of that may be true, but again, I think that limits the concept.



I wonder what would happen if I began asking myself, "What mood does this scene evoke in me," before I took the photograph? Would it change the way I composed the image, or might it change the perspective from which I shot it? Usually, I asked myself, "What interests me about this scene?" That's a valid question, but it seems much more "head oriented," than "feeling oriented." And it is feelings that grab our attention and perhaps help us relate more to the image. So even though the question of interest has a place there, perhaps the question of mood is more important. "What interests me here and what feelings does this scene evoke in me?" Perhaps that question would help zero in on what really needs to be captured in the scene while also directing how I process the image and even how I share it with others. The hope is that I can convey through the image the same feelings I had when viewing the scene and that warrants a consideration of the mood of the scene.

So, the mood of an image is not just eerie, but can also be sad, lonely, angry, peaceful, joyful, serene, and almost any other feeling you can name. The art here is being in touch with our own feelings about a scene, being able to name that feeling, and then properly capture the image in hopes of bringing those emotions to another person.

Mood does have a lot to do with the lighting of a scene, but it also has to do with the colors and the different shades of those colors represented there. We speak of "warming" a photo with yellows or "cooling" photos with blue. Both of those are feelings evoked by the colors and important for setting the mood of an image—joyful and happy, or somber and moody. There are volumes on how different colors and their combinations evoke certain moods in the viewer. Complimentary colors, for instance, create tension in an image. Analogous colors evoke peace and calm.

Admittedly, I know enough about the whole subject to be dangerous, so I advise that you look to more scholarly individuals to learn how all this works. My main point here is that it might prove valuable to consider not only what interests you in a scene but also to consider what mood or feeling that scene evokes.

Photography 201 – Going from Snap-shots to Great Shots By Henry Smith

This is a six-week series designed for HPS members who are familiar with the basics of using their camera and desire to improve the quality of their photos. Participants should be able to adjust shutter speed and aperture (no smartphone cameras please).

The functions of the camera and their impact on the image, photographic composition and different approaches to photography will be discussed covering new topics each week.

Students are then expected to complete and email weekly assignments back to the instructor for in-class positive critiques the following week. No equipment is needed in the classroom. This is a participatory class, no auditing please.

HPS has not taught this class in-person for a couple of years since the arrival of Covid but is considering restarting it if there is adequate interest. It will be taught in the evenings once a week at a convenient location if there is adequate interest.




